

Minutes of Warminster ARC

March 7, 2002 Dave, AA3UR, Secretary

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mark Kempisty, N3GNW. During the last VE session, several people upgraded or received new licenses. Among them was Rocky, N3FKR, who upgraded to Extra. The minutes from the February meeting, as printed in *Feedback* were approved. The Hamfest will be held on May 5, 2002 at the Grange Fairgrounds. This is the major fund-raiser for the club and needs the active support of club members. The February auction was a great success, special thanks for highvalue donations go to Joe Bagnick, N3EMA for donating a 6 meter transverter and, posthumo usly, to Hank Hammermin, N3NID, for a laboratorygrade SWR meter. The club website has had some upgrades and new features that are detailed below. The by-laws and constitution of the club are in the process of being reviewed by Russ Tobias and the board of directors. The changes will reflect the incorporated status of the club and enable the application for not-for-profit status under IRS section 501 (3) (C). The changes will be presented to the club 60 days prior to voting, as required by the constitution. Burt, N3YVH, will host the Holiday Dinner this year, but due to additional responsibilities at work, he is asking for help in getting door prizes. Randy, N3LGE, has asked that two people assist him; one as an alternate and another as an assistant. The duties will amount to picking up doughnuts before the meeting, making coffee, arranging drinks, and helping to clean up after the meeting.

Vahan KB3DHU gave the treasurer's report.

Dave, AA3UR, mentioned that each subcommittee, should report any official action they take to the secretary, to have it included in the minutes. For example, we should add the official list of people who passed the last license exams to the minutes.

Bill KA3ZMA reported the progress made on the Hamfest. We need helpers to sign up for the various duties. This includes parking for vendors, parking for visitors, collecting admissions, Saturday preparation time, and Sunday afternoon clean-up time. Please let him know if you have a favorite vendor who should be informed of the Hamfest and let anyone interested in attending know about it. In particular, Bill needs to talk to those who have put up the road signs leading to the Hamfest. He needs some signs made. Please get in touch with him.

Bud K3TPM and Mark WA3QBU covered the membership committee activities. There are now 127 active members, not counting renewals during the meeting. We got six renewals from inactive members by a mailing campaign. The last *Feedback* included a sheet with information on the repeaters in the area. If you need extra copies or have corrections, let Mark know.

Brian, N3EXA, said that not much was going on at the two meter site. They are waiting for the red tape to be finis hed to dig up the tank at the site of the tower. The 440MHz repeater antenna is nearly ready to be put up sometime in the spring. The board is considering buying a new antenna, to insure trouble-free operation.

George, N3HBT reported that the next public service was a golf outing on the first Thursday of June. Certificates are available for those who participated in past outings.

The March of Dimes Walk-a-thon is set for April 28, 2002. This will be done at Core Creek Park and at Peace Valley Park. In addition the Multiple Sclerosis Society will piggy-back their walk the same weekend at Tyler State Park. A total of 15 to 20 people will be needed.

George KA3WXV reported that the no-code Technician class will start on March 11, 2002 at 7:30 PM at the Senior Center.

RACES/ARES Mike, W3MJP, reported that a Limmerick emergency exercise will be held May 7, 2002 from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM for Montgomery County, and 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM for Bucks County. There will be a Skywarn meeting in Mount Holly, NJ April 9, 2002. In addition, a Skywarn training session at the Warminster Ambulance Squad.

Al, WI3Z, reported on the upgrades to the club website. It is on a new server in a different physical location as before. This server has more features available, including a bulletin board feature, listserver, and enhanced email services. The URL is the same as before, http://www.k3dn.org.

The nomination committee is soliciting input from club members who want to run in the elections for club officers. Please let them know if you want to run or want to nominate someone else.

During a crisis, county turns to hams

Members of amateur radio organizations can be activated to assist firefighters, police and the local emergency management agencies, or provide better communication.

The Blizzard of '96 became the Flood of '96 after a January meltdown in eastern Upper Bucks. Hundreds of Tinicum and Bridgeton residents escaped the rising waters of the Delaware River and sought refuge inland at Palisades High School in Nocka mixon.

Firefighters, police and the local emergency management agencies were to busy to count how many people found shelter at the school and how much aid would be needed from the American Red Cross

That's where a group of "hams" came in: the ARES/RACES ham radio organization.

Their equipment and services have proved so invaluable during emergencies that Tinicum and Nockamixon's emergency management agencies are looking into buying their own ham radio equipment and adding ARES/RACES (Amateur Radio Emergency Services and Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services Organization) members to their list of volunteers. Members are scattered throughout the county, but most live in Central Bucks. They can be found in almost every county in the state.

"They were able to tell the county radio room the information we were to busy to gather," said Tom Macfarlan, coordinator of Nockamixon's Emergency Management Agency. The emergency management agency is made up of volunteers who are activated when police and fire companies cannot handle an emergency alone.

During the flooding in '96, members of the organization headed to the high school with cars full of amateur radio equipment as soon as they heard of the evacuation over their county radio scanners. As emergency workers unloaded displaced families at the school, the hams counted each head and sent a report to the hub of Emergency Management Agency communications, the Emergency Operations Center in Warminster.

They act as aids to the trained emergency workers, but their radios also offer open lines of communication. "They are one more means of communication. During a disaster, our radios can get backed up with calls," Skelton said.

Tinicum and Nockamixon are currently looking into what kind of equipment they will need and how much it will cost, said Doug Skelton, the director of Tinicum's Emergency Management Agency. Once it is in place, emergency management volunteers will be trained on the ham radio, but members of the radio group can still be called in to operate the equipment. Nockamixon has already received a donated radio antenna that he hopes can be mounted on top of the mu nicipal building.

"Federal, state and local emergency management agencies can call us in if there is a disaster," said Bob Phillips of Plumstead, one of the leaders of the radio group. "I dispatch our 85 members to where they are needed."

They could be asked to count heads at evacuation shelters or measure the height of a rising river.

"I head to the Emergency Operations Center to receive their reports. Then I personally take the information to the proper people so they can send it over the county radio," Phillips said. Each municipality's emergency management agency communicates with the Emergency Operations Center in Warminster. Police and firefighters talk to the county radio room in Doylestown. But, a dispatcher from the county radio goes to the EOC during an emergency to relay information back to the county room. Although Tinicum has yet to call on the radio group during an emergency, their equipment will help fill the gaps in communication.

"There are areas on River Road where our radios won't work," Skelton said. "Once we get our ham radio equipment, the dead zones should be eliminated." Phillips said the cliffs that line the river block the radio transmissions, causing the gaps. "They just go straight up and get lost in space, so we can help them by bending the signal." Some members of the radio group have a repeater, a device that picks up signals then rebroadcasts them. They park on top of the cliff to pick up the signals, thus bending them over the cliff and to the intended receiver. The last time Nockamixon and Tinicum's emergency management agencies were needed was during Tropical Storm

Floyd in September 1999. The


