

# **Bucks County EMA Presentation featuring Capt. Al Haynes**

Mile (W3MJP), Frank (WD0ESL) and I attended a meeting on March 25th at Council Rock South High School conducted by Bucks County Emergency Management with the featured speaker being Capt. Al Haynes (ret.) of United Airlines. He was the pilot of United 232 on July 19, 1989 that suffered damage to all 3 of its hydraulic systems rendering the plane essentially uncontrollable. Through his and his crew's heroic efforts he was able to maintain the plane in the air until crashlanding it at Sioux City, Iowa. Although there was loss of life, his efforts resulted in the saving of 185 lives.

Capt. Haynes' excellent talk focused both on the aspects of flying the plane under these impossible conditions and the efforts of the emergency personnel involved in the rescue. He dis cussed aspects of the emergency response and his own training that all of us who are involved in emergency work through ARES and RACES can learn from.

Capt. Haynes placed a great deal of emphasis on teamwork, training, communication (in the personal sense) and following Standard Operating Procedures. He emphasized additionally that extensive training makes the response to a difficult situation much easier and almost automatic while having systematic SOPs to follow for any situation can get you through any foreseeable eventuality. Unfortunately for Flight 232 by the time they had lost all the hydraulic systems they had exhausted the SOP and it was time to improvise. Improvise and never give up.

Also mentioned was something that is important to us as radio operators. The air traffic controller was always calm in his communications that had a calming effect on the crew who were always very calm in their communications. He pointed out that at the time of the crash the emergency people on the ground began to lose their cool and began shouting into their radios. This has the detrimental effect of causing others to become overexcited and communications can begin to deteriorate. Tapes of all these communications were played for us.

Capt. Haynes also mentioned after the meeting to several of us that ham radio operators were instrumental in providing communications from the survivors to their families in the immediate aftermath of the crash. Due to the normal communications being occupied with the emergency at hand there was no available communications for health and welfare traffic. Hams filled that gap.

Also making a brief presentation was a PEMA manager who discussed NIMS (National Incident Management System) and ICS (Incident Command System) along with issues of interoperability. Jim, WA4YWM

Send letter to shrine about 1 march requesting permission to use North field for field day weekend. Follow-up with call to Father Stephan, 3 weeks later, if no response comes from him. After approval from Father Stephan—about 1 April-1 may send thank you letter and check for \$150.00 for the shrine maintenance fund.

Call "parties & more", or another vendor, to order tables, chairs, ice coolers about 1 April—tell them to use the previous order for details. Provide a credit card to secure the order.

At May meeting confirm status of Generators, Band Captains, and help for Friday setup. See if the Band Captains need anything, usually they are ok.

Call Hank from Shrine about midmay to arrange for tent. If tent cannot be made available order one thru the vendor. This has not happened since we started supporting the shrine events.

Collect 20cases of soda and 2 -48 bottles of water on sale before event (Feb-June)

At Jun Meeting confirm with KA3VKU that he can pick up trailer at George's son's house. Have him call George's son to let him know when he will be there. Support him in getting hams to help him.

One week before the event go to shop & bag in Dublin and order lunch tray

for Saturday morning at 1130. At pickup get 1 white bread, 2 rye bread & 1 whole wheat bread, mustard and mayonnaise above the food tray.

About a week before go to Pizza place (Kmart shopping center) and clarify they will be there Saturday till 10 or 11PM. Agree on latest time you can order about 6-8 pies. Arrange for a ham to copy W1AW Field day message and send a message to ARRL section manager at Field day for bonus points.

On Friday check tent setup, meet parties and more, and along with setup personnel stack tables and chairs under cover in restroom front area or under the tent if setup.

Ensure that one of our members will be at shrine Friday night to keep eye on all the material we leave there.

On Friday night or Saturday morning get 6 big ice cube packs and box of garbage bags

On Saturday morning get gasoline. Work with whoever is doing food to get what they need. Set up visitor's area and have club and ARRL material to hand out. Use a sign up sheet to track the visitors to the site.

Saturday night get Pizza and bring up to shrine site about 11PM

Throughout the event keep a list of all club members that attended. The ARRL form requires a number. I used a club member sign up sheet for that purpose.

Have pictures taken during the event, both for our web site and to include in the ARRL submission. I used pictures of the Shrine and the visitor's area to back up bonus point claim.

Collect logs on disk from all band captains. They will be needed for ARRL submission.

Sunday work with cleanup crew and ensure tables/chairs/coolers get stacked

in bathroom area under cover.

Check site for cleanliness before we leave

Format the ARRL submit – Logs with ARRL Cover sheet, pictures and sign up sheets.

This was a nice little uptick toward the solar cycle minimum, coming with the start of spring in the Northern Hemisphere. Unfortunately for HF operators, the average geomagnetic numbers doubled as well. This and the associated aurora were triggered by a solar wind stream that hit Earth starting last Saturday, March 18. Maximal effects were felt the following day, when the College A index-measured less than two degrees latitude south of the Arctic Circle--rose to 51 on March 19. Saturday's College A index was 39, but on Friday, March 17 it was only 2--very quiet. The Planetary A index over those same days was 3, 26 and 37, and the mid-latitude A index was 2, 15 and 24.

This weekend is the CQ World Wide WPX Contest (SSB), and there shouldn't be any nasty surprises regarding propagation. Predicted planetary A index for the next five days, March 24-28, is 12, 12, 10, 7 and 5.

Sunspot numbers for March 16 through 22 were 22, 24, 27, 40, 33, 39 and 49, with a mean of 33.4. The 10.7 cm flux was 72.4, 72, 72.4, 75.2, 76.9, 76.7, and 75.9, with a mean of 74.5. Estimated planetary A indices were 6,

3, 26, 37, 22, 13 and 10, with a mean of 16.7. Estimated mid-latitude A indices were 4, 2, 15, 24, 14, 8 and 9, with a mean of 10.9.

### NASA honors TV journalist, anchor Walter Cronkite, KB2GSD

NASA has honored legendary CBS TV news anchor Walter Cronkite, KB2GSD, for his coverage of the US space program. Cronkite, who has narrated two ARRL Amateur Radio videos, received the Ambassador of Exploration Award February 28. "His marathon, live coverage of the first moon landing brought the excitement and impact of the historic event into the homes of millions of Americans and observers around the world." NASA said in announcing the award. NASA is presenting the Ambassador of Exploration Award to the 38 astronauts and other key individuals who participated in the Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo space programs for realizing America's vision of space exploration from 1961 to 1972. Cronkite is the first non-astronaut and only NASA outsider to receive the award, which consists of a small, encased sample of lunar material mounted for public display. Cronkite is the best-remembered journalist for his commentary and enthusiastic coverage of the historic progression of missions

from the early Mercury launches, through the ground-breaking Gemini missions, to the Apollo 11 and subsequent moon landings.

## DX still king for 90-year-old radio amateur

Veteran DXer and contester ohn Thompson, W1BIH, has been largely out of the game since disposing of his tower, antennas and linear and moving into a retirement community in Massachusetts last year. But the DXCC Honor Roll member held onto his transceiver and his desire to work the few rare ones he lacked. When the 3Y0X Peter I DXpedition got under way in February, Don Greenbaum, N1DG, did his older friend a good turn by taking Thompson to his station February 9 for a crack at 3Y0X. During the last two Peter I Island DXpeditions, Thompson was at his winter home, PJ9JT, so Peter I has been among his most wanted. It only took about 30 minutes for W1BIH to make himself heard through the fray on 15-meter SSB and exchange reports. "We got him!" Thompson exclaimed seconds after the quick QSO. Greenbaum captured the occasion on video <a href="http://005d89a">http://005d89a</a>. netsolhost.com/videos/videos/ w1bih.wmv>. Once confirmed and submitted to DXCC, the 3Y0X QSO will elevate W1BIH into a tie for second place in the DXCC standings at 390 entities--including deleted entities--or 335 current entities. W1BIH subsequently worked 3Y0X from his retirement community station on 20-meter CW while running 100 W into a G5RV strung from his window some 20 feet above ground.


