SOLAR UPDATE

Tad "Staring at the Sun <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_mo9xg-_sSw>" Cook, K7RA, reports: This was another week where average daily sunspot numbers declined, while average daily solar flux increased. The predicted solar flux is 125 on January 26, 120 on January 27-30, 125 on January 31-February 2, 140 on February 3-8, 145 and 150 on February 9-10, 155 on February 11-13, 150 on February 14-19, and then 145 on February 20-23. That's right – the long-anticipated short-term solar flux peak of 165 from February 17-21 is gone. The last forecast <see% 20http://www.swpc.noaa.gov/ftpdir/forecasts/45DF/012345DF.txt> which still held this number was on January 23, and on January 24 it changed <http://www.swpc.noaa.gov/ftpdir/forecasts/45DF/012445DF.txt>. The predicted planetary A index is 5 on January 26, 8 on January 27-28 and 5 on January 29 to February 7, 8 on February 8-9, and then 5 again on February 10-23. ARMY MARS RESUMES USE OF WINLINK 2000

According to Government Liaison for Army MARS http://www.mil/mars/ Pudge Forrester, AAA9GL, Lieutenant General Susan Lawrence has reversed the decision to phase out the use of the Winlink 2000 http://www.winlink.org/ global radio e-mail system by Army MARS members. General Lawrence stated that the Army -- after reviewing its capabilities -- had decided that the continued use of Winlink 2000 was a valuable asset to Army MARS members and to the agencies that were using the service. She issued a statement to that effect on December 21, 2011. On January 5, 2012, the Chief of Army MARS officially notified his membership that the phase out notice had been rescinded. Army MARS members and agencies who had been using the service hailed the decision by General Lawrence and resumed use of Winlink 2000.

AMATEUR RADIO IN SPACE: ARISSAT-1 RE-ENTERS EARTH'S ATMOSPHERE, FALLS SILENT

According to AMSAT <http://www.amsat.org/amsat-new/index.php>, ARISSat-1 stopped transmitting <http://www.arissat1.org/v3/ > on the morning of January 4. It is believed that the satellite re-entered the

Earth's atmosphere around 0700 UTC (+/- three hours) and was destroyed soon after. Telemetry reports showed that the temperature aboard ARISSat-1 had been rising as the atmospheric drag began to affect the satellite The predicted decay location is an open part of the South Atlantic, well west of Angola.

The last telemetry reports indicated that the internal temperature had topped 167 degrees Fahrenheit and was rising rapidly. Kon-

stantin Vladimirovich, RN3ZF, sent a reception report of a pass at 0842 UTC and stated, "The telemetry was absent, voice messages were not legible, very silent and interrupted. Most likely, I saw the last minutes in the

life of the satellite." The last full telemetry captured was received from ground stations as the satellite passed over Japan at 0602 UTC on January 4.

ARISSat-1 was deployed <http://www.arrl.org/news/arissat-1-finally-deployed-from-iss> from the International Space Station on August 3, 2011 during EVA-29 on by Cosmonaut/Flight Engineers Sergei Volkov, RU3DIS, and Alexander Samokutyaev. The satellite carried a student experiment from Kursk State University in Russia that measured atmospheric density. Students from around the world provided the voices for the FM voice announcements.

AMSAT President Barry Baines, WD4ASW, said that ARISSat-1 marked a new type of satellite that captured the attention of the national space agencies around the world. "With ARISSat-1, we have we have been able to design, launch, and operate a unique educational opportunity," he explained. "By designing an educational mission aligned with NASA's Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics goals, radio amateurs around the world have been able enjoy a new satellite in orbit."

ARISSat-1 achieved several "firsts" for Amateur Radio in space, including the first flight test of the AMSAT Software Defined Transponder, which included an FM voice downlink cycling between student messages, spoken telemetry and SSTV; a 16 kHz bandwidth linear transponder; a CW beacon carrying telemetry and call signs of radio amateurs (noting their significant contributions to Amateur Radio in space) and a robust, forward-error-corrected 1kbps BPSK digital downlink carrying satellite telemetry and Kursk experiment telemetry.

PUBLIC SERVICE: HAMS IN ARKANSAS AND ALABAMA HELP PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO NWS DURING SEVERE SUNDAY STORMS

Strong winds and tornadoes moved through Arkansas and Alabama on Sunday, January 22. In response to the storms, the National Weather Service office in Little Rock activated Arkansas SYWARN the same afternoon, while ARES members were activated in parts of Alabama.

Arkansas SKYWARN Program Coordinator Danny Straessle, KE5WLR, summoned a team of radio amateurs and headed to the NWS office to provide communications support to the forecasters. While Straessle was enroute to the NWS office, Daryl Stout, AE5WX, brought up the Weather Watch Net, a pre-net for Arkansas SKYWARN. By 6 PM, the Arkansas SKYWARN net control team was in place and the NWS issued the first tornado warning for the area. At this time, Straessle and Shane Lee, KF5FBR, took over as Net Control for the Arkansas SKYWARN net. They were assisted by Mona Blacklaw, KM5ONA. The NWS received reports of tornadoes in Arkansas, Dallas, Lonoke, Prairie and Cleveland Counties.

In addition to activity by Arkansas SKYWARN, ARES members in Alabama also helped to provide communications support in that state. According to David Gillespie, W4LHQ, of the Jefferson County Emergency Management Agency, hams across Central Alabama began monitoring the storm conditions in preparation for a possible activation. "Hams deployed to the National Weather Service office to relay storm observations and damage reports," he told the ARRL. "When the NWS issued a tornado warning that evening, local ARES members began an emergency communications net. Net Control logged reports from 34 stations through the night. When the storms cleared, these damage reports were used to dispatch first responders to the areas that sustained the most severe damage." Fourteen hams reported to the Jefferson County EMA, where Gillespie coordinated communications for three shelters run by the American Red Cross.

This is a picture of my balcony with the antennas I used for the January VHF contest. On the left is a Diamond 2m/70cm antenna. In the middle is a borrowed 6m squalo from Ray Goley - a fellow Pack Rat. On the right is a small table with a 16x19 piece of heavy metal and a 230 MHz mag mount on it. I live on the 2nd of 3 stories.

I was able to make 119 contacts, but very limited in the grids. I missed out on the signals coming up from Florida as my unit faces North and the building blocks most signals except for very strong close stations.

Luckily I didn't hear from the condo association about leaving the squalo up, but now that the contest is over it's a mute point. I would like to put up a 6m/10m dipole that will fit on the balcony. When that picture is taken I will resend it to the association and see if they will allow me to keep it up all the time. Now I have to look into more stealthy HF antennas and then I will finally be able to get on those bands and not have it be only on Field day.


