President's Message



First, let me thank the members of the Warminster Amateur Radio club for re-electing me and for some new members who stepped up to get more involved in the oversight of this organization. The club rides on the shoulders of the members who carry it forward.

I am writing this message just moments after Field Day 2007 has come to a close. We have packed up and dispersed ourselves once again from the hospitality of those at Our Lady of Czestochowa. The spacious location they let us use has become a comfortable, if occasionally rainy, spot to hold this annual amateur event.

Amateur Radio is many different things to many people. Several aspects can be agreed upon: it is service based, it is technical, it can be social and fun. Field Day is one of those instances when all of those aspects are rolled into one. We practice emergency preparedness for potential service. We overcome technical challenges of setting up lots of gear in an empty field in a matter of hours. And we spend two days socializing with our comrades and with other amateurs around the world over the air waves.

We meet new people during these types of events and have an opportunity to imbue them with a new understanding of what amateur radio is. We also have an opportunity to challenge ourselves with new activities. Taking on the challenges of Field Day also usually teaches us a new thing or two as well.

After french toast & bacon filled our bellies, the logs were topped off with a few more hours of operating till the gunshot sounded and field day was over.

FIELD DAY 07:

Rich (KB3NRL):

- Tents are lined up. Sodas and water are lined up. I am getting food squared away.

We almost have all of the band captains settled. We just need volunteers to set up and operate. Please, let me know when you can be available and what you would like to do.

This year there will absolutely be no rain! Rich promises!

REPEATER:

AL (WI3Z):

- The 175 ft tower is being constructed in stages at the EOC. WARC will have a 150ft berth on it. Anyone who wants to see the tower, go over by Ann's Choice: you can't miss it. It is going up quickly.

- As far as I know, the repeater is running OK.

- AL (W3STW): Can you tell me a little bit about the tower: I live adjacent to it and I have been telling people that they should be happy that it is there.

- AL (WI3Z): I don't know the details of it and it is part of the Bucks Co 911 system. They are bringing 911 from Doylestown over to the EOC. They are expanding the EOC; they are basically moving all emergency operations over to that area.

- Doylestown is going to be the secondary location for Bucks Co, as opposed to Ivyland being the secondary location for the 911 center. It is not a commercial antenna; it is a county antenna and it is going to be 175ft tall. It should solve a lot of their problems. We negotiated because of our community. We are going to get a 150ft berth there. We are probably going to continue to keep our antenna where it is at the Warminster police station. That will be a secondary repeater site. We are looking forward to it: we will be able to be heard everywhere.

AL (W3STW): You are not too far away from me if I can be of any help.
AL (WI3Z): Yes, if you want to

climb the tower to put up the antenna! Most likely we are going to keep the repeater at the Warminster Police Dept. The idea is then we don't have any repeaters at the EOC. We have receivers at: Abington, Hilltown, Bristol, Warminster, and Warrington. I believe Abington might have been turned off because we had a problem, but I am not sure about that. Brian (N3EXA) is looking into putting receivers potentially over at Trooper to cover Fort Washington and maybe Philadelphia. All of these remote receivers point to the transmitter site and then the signals are retransmitted out. But we don't have to have duplexes or any of the problems of duplexes when it is set up that way. The EOC antenna will be a retransmit site. With our repeater we have the potential of putting out easily over 150w which we tone down a lot. At the 150ft height on the EOC tower we can probably run a lot less power. We have to get everything coordinated so we don't cause any interference, but Brian is keeping an eye on it.

Tad "Walking on Sunshine" Cook, K7RA, this week reports: June 23-24 is ARRL Field Day, and it follows a week with no sunspots. As expected, there was a mild geomagnetic upset on

(*Continued from page 4*) Thursday, June 21 when a solar wind stream pushed against Earth's magnetic field. The planetary A index went to 14, a moderate level, but the mid-latitude A index, which affects most of us more directly, was only 8. That number comes from the Fredericksburg Geomagnetic Center near Corbin, Virginia, which is at 38.2 degrees north latitude. Boulder, Colorado provides the mid-latitude A index that we hear on WWV at 18 minutes after each hour, and at 40 degrees north latitude, it produced an A index of 12 for June 21. For the weekend, we might see another sunspot appear by Sunday, so it looks like any 10 meter propagation will be sporadic-E skip, not any great openings based on a higher MUF. Predicted planetary A index for June 22-24, Friday through Sunday, is 15, 10 and 8. Predicted solar flux is 68, 68 and 70. A solar flux value below 70 implies no sunspots, which you can observe along side zero sunspot days at

Geophysical Institute Prague predicts unsettled to active conditions June 22, unsettled June 23 and quiet June 24-25, quiet to unsettled June 26 and back to quiet June 27-28. After 2100 UTC on Friday, check this again for a June 22 update. NEVADA HAM PLAYS ROLE IN RADIO RESCUE

ARRL member Eric Christianson, KE7DZZ, of Reno, Nevada, was just listening to the repeater for background noise May 26, but an emergency call made him sit up and take notice.

"I immediately grabbed the mic and asked 'What's the nature of the emergency?' The guy said that he was in a remote area with a downed motorcycle rider who appeared to have a serious neck injury. He said the injured man couldn't sit up without feeling dizzy."

On the other end of the circuit was Dave Kersting, KF6QQO, of Redondo Beach, California, who'd been out riding his motorcycle with friends that day. Before he left, Kersting grabbed his 2 meter handheld radio, programmed with some repeater frequencies along their route, and his handheld GPS unit.

"Dave gave me the GPS coordinates of their location, so I called my local 911 dispatch, Washoe County," Christianson said. He relayed the coordinates to the 911 dispatcher, who asked him to remain on in contact with Kersting until EMS arrived at the scene. "Washoe County couldn't find these guys," Christianson recounted. "It seems Dave's GPS had given the wrong coordinates, but another guy in the group had a GPS, and he got different coordinates. I gave dispatch the new coordinates, and by using them, they found the group."

The new coordinates placed the group inside Mono County, California. Washoe County then called Mono County. A bout 7:15 PM, a helicopter ambulance, called Christianson on the phone to let him know their pilot was in flight near the area and asked if he had any more details for them. The chopper landed just a few minutes later and transported the injured biker to a local hospital.

An ARES member and a ham for two years, Christianson first became interested in Amateur Radio because he wanted to help people in need. "I normally would have been on 20 meters looking for some DX, but I had the radio on the repeater memo ry scan just because it was quieter than listening to HF while I worked at my computer," he said. "Thank God for that, I helped to save a life."

"The real hero is Dave, who had the presence of mind to program in local repeater frequencies. The other hero is Amateur Radio. What we do with Amateur Radio is great, and I am so proud to be a part of it."


