President's Message



Being a VE

Since this past January, the WARC VE team has provided ham radio licensing tests for about 50 candidates. Nearly all the candidates have been successful, with many receiving their initial Technician class license, and many others upgrading to General or Extra.

As I was sending the latest materials in to ARRL VEC, I was reminded what testing was like before the volunteer examination program began. In order to take a test, a candidate had to travel to an FCC field office. These offices were usually located in major cities across the country. For those of us who lived in the suburbs of Philadelphia, this was not a major problem as there was a field office in center city.

However, those who did not live near a field office had to travel great distances – sometimes hundreds of miles – in order to take the exam. The FCC did occasionally send examiners to areas that were far removed from a field office, but these sessions might take place only one or two times a year. Needless to say, those who had physical disabilities or those who were unable to travel found it very difficult to obtain a ham license. The FCC did eventually attempt to address some of the problems by allowing candidates that met certain conditions to be tested by other hams and to be granted what was called a Conditional class license. This method of administering ham radio licensing tests existed from the early days of ham radio until 1984.

In the early 1980's, budget cuts for the

FCC began to reduce the number of examiners and limit the opportunities for candidates to take a ham radio exam. Something had to be done. In 1982, Senator Barry Goldwater (who was a ham) sponsored a bill in Congress that would modify the Communications Act of 1934 to allow the FCC to accept the voluntary and uncompensated services of licensed hams to prepare and administer ham radio exams. The Goldwater-Wirth bill was passed and signed into law by President Ronald Reagan. By 1984, Volunteer Examination Coordinators (VEC's) were established and began to certify Volunteer Examiners. Before that year was out, the VE program had replaced the FCC field offices for administering ham radio exams. Today there are 14 VEC's across the country (the ARRL being just one of them) with many thousands of hams certified to give exams.

My own involvement with the VE program began a few years ago at the WARC Hamfest. At the time, Tom WA3TQJ (SK) was coordinating VE testing for the club. He was setting up for the test session at the Hamfest and realized that one of the VE's that was scheduled to be there was unable to attend. Three VE's are required to conduct a session, and there were only two. As he was looking for a third VE, he asked me if I was qualified. Unfortunately, I had to tell him I was not. Eventually a third VE arrived and the testing session was able to begin. However, it was then that I realized that being a VE and having the opportunity to administer ham radio exams would be a great way to give back to the hobby that had given me so much enjoyment for so many years. Within a month I was able to qualify as a VE.

Personally I count it a privilege to be a VE. It is not a job that brings any kind of financial reward – we all serve as uncompensated volunteers. It is not an effort-free job – there is some paperwork involved. It is not always an easy job – sometimes you have to tell a candidate they did not pass. But there is something very rewarding and satisfying about helping someone obtain their first ham license or get that license upgrade.

Perhaps you would like to become a VE and join the WARC VE team. You will need to have an Extra class license (although General class licensees can administer Technician class tests). Then, to be certified by ARRL/VEC, all you need to do is study the Volunteer Examiner Manual and pass a reasonably easy open-book test – something that takes just a few hours. Some of the other VEC's have similar requirements for certification. You can find just about everything you need on-line, or you can contact me for assistance.

I think you will find, as I have, that being a VE is one of the most rewarding and exciting opportunities in amateur radio today.

We've now seen 11 days with no sunspots. The average daily solar flux from May 6-12 dropped from 75.8 to 69.2 for the week of May 13-19. This may end soon, as sunspot group 1063 is due to return in the next two days, and predictions show a rising solar flux: 70 for May 20-21, 72 for May 22-23, 74 for May 24-25, 76 for May 26 and 80 for May 27-June 4. There is also a prediction of geomagnetic instability for today, May 20, with planetary A index for May 20-23 of 18, 15, 8 and 5. The latest issue of WorldRadio online is available for download

FCC NEWS: FCC PROPOSES ADDITIONS, CHANGES TO AMATEUR 5 MHZ ALLOCATION

Acting on a 2006 *Petition for Rulemaking* filed by the ARRL, the FCC has issued a *Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM)*, ET Docket No 10-98 to modify the rules that govern amateurs' secondary use of five channels in the 5 MHz frequency range known as 60 meters. The proposed changes would substitute a new channel for one that is seldom available because of occupancy by the fixed service, which is primary in this range. Also proposed is an increase in power from 50 to 100 W effective radiated power (ERP) and the addition of CW, PSK31 and PACTOR-III modes with provisions to ensure that such operations would be compatible with the primary service. The proposed changes can be found beginning on page 8 of the *NPRM*.

"The ARRL is pleased that the Commission has opened this proceeding to increase the usefulness of the limited 5 MHz Amateur Service allocation," said ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ. "We are gratified that the Commission and the NTIA agree that the responsible manner in which amateurs have been using the five USB channels warrants some expansion of privileges so that the Amateur Service can be even better prepared for service to the public."

Background

The 60 meter band is part of the larger 5060-5450 kHz band that is allocated to the fixed service on a primary basis for Federal and non-Federal use, and to the mobile (except aeronautical mobile service) on a secondary basis for Federal and non-Federal use. Per footnote US381 to the Allocation Table, this makes five frequencies in this band -- 5332 kHz, 5348 kHz, 5368 kHz, 5373 kHz and 5405 kHz -- available to the Amateur Service on a secondary basis. In addition, footnote US340 authorizes Federal and non-Federal maritime and aeronautical mobile stations to use the 2-30 MHz band (which includes the 60 meter band) for measuring the quality of

reception on radio channels on a non-interference basis; however, actual communication by these stations is limited to frequencies specifically allocated to these services.

In 2003, the FCC added the Amateur Service secondary allocation to this band after determining that such frequencies could be useful to the Amateur Radio Service for completing disaster communications links at times when existing frequencies in the 80, 75 and 40 meter bands are not available due to ionospheric conditions. The FCC concluded "that such an allocation represented the best compromise available to give the Amateur Radio Service access to new spectrum for a wide range of radio communications, while assuring that incumbent operations are protected."

At the request of the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), the FCC restricted the use of these five channels to single sideband suppressed carrier voice using only the upper sideband transmission, and a maximum effective radiated power (ERP) of 50 W peak envelope power (PEP). The Commission adopted these operating restrictions to decrease the interference potential between amateur stations and federal stations.

One of the available channels, 5368 kHz, be replaced with 5358.5 kHz

The maximum ERP on channels in the 60 meter band be increased from 50 to 100 W PEP, provided that amateurs utilize Voice-Operated Transmit (VOX) while in the single sideband emission mode, so as to permit the amateur operator to hear an attempt by another station, which may be a Federal user, to utilize the channel

Three additional emission designators -- 150HA1A (Morse code telegraphy by means of on-off keying), 60H0J2B (generally known

as PSK31) and 2K80J2D (generally known as PACTOR-III) -- be authorized in the 60 meter band, provided that the operators using these modes utilize great care to limit the length of transmissions so as to avoid interference with Federal operations.

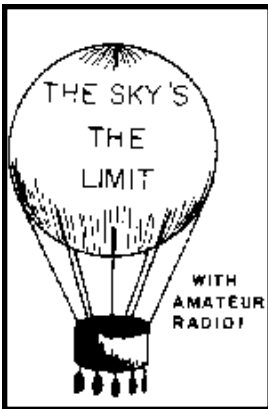

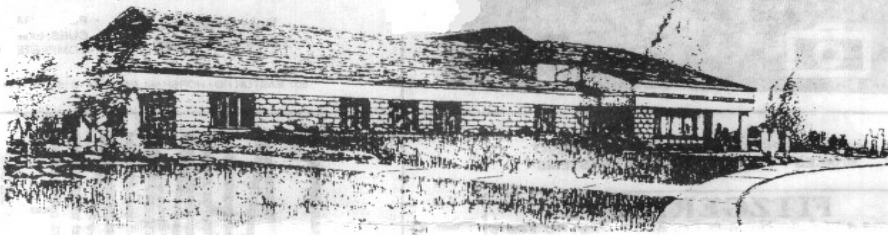
