equipment that had faded buttons and face plates didn't really appeal to me. That's what I thought awaited. I couldn't have been more wrong. There were people of all ages in attendance including parents and grandparents who brought their eager young children with them.

Besides the old radios with the faded dials, face plate and vacuum tubes, I wasn't expecting to see a portable phonograph player with a large and bulky spindle that was used with those new fangled 45's everyone started playing at that time. When I was a kid I remember listening to the Beatles "You say goodbye and I say hello" and "76 Trombones in the big parade" (my mother loves musicals) on a record player just like that. Something else that warmed my heart and brought back memories were t wo ¼ inch magnetic reel to reel tape decks that a guy named Steve brought with him. He also brought several store bought prerecorded music from several Pop and Rock n' Roll groups from the sixties such as The Mamas and Papas and Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young.

What made one of those tape decks all the more glorious was that Steve had already threaded a reel with the theme of a TV show he used to watch. He turned on the machine and cranked the volume up. When I heard the melodious tones coming out of the speakers, I just lit up. It was the opening theme to Star Trek - the original series. (Oh be still my beating heart). I was in heaven from that point on. Was it fate or something else, but that night I just happened to be wearing my Star Trek T-shirt (original series) under my sweater. Yes, I am a Trekkie, a term I much prefer over Trekker.

Steve, the owner, said he used to sit in front of the TV and tape record Star Trek (long before the invention of the VCR) and listen to the show over and over until the following week. I can relate to that because this is something I did about 5 years later in the early 70's only at that time I had graduated onto cassette tapes and it was a different show. Steve also had a 1960's Swedish jute box which played 45 rpm records. What made this unit unique was that it would play the A and then B side of a record before moving onto the next selection. This was unlike American jute boxes which would play the A side of a bunch of 45's and then go back and play the B side afterwards. The machine was also was called something like Lennon's Jute Box because John Lennon used to own one.

Next was an old radio with a nice antique looking wooden box in which the owner took great pains searching for a certain grade of walnut to build a new lid for the case. The radio was brought to the meet in this refurbished case wrapped in an old faded army issued blanket. Thus making this antique all the more authentic looking.

Next was a young man who was showcasing a 1984 Panasonic portable CD player. One of the first of it's kind. He mentioned how this tough, but heavy piece of equipment sounds better and is more durable than most cd players produced today. This young man was born the first year they introduced the Sony Walkman, 1979. The year I graduated from High School. I still have the original Sony Walkman lying around. I didn't have the heart to throw it away even though there are several loose and missing pieces. With a little care, it could be restored to new. That little radio sounded better than most walkmans and other portable devices I've heard to this day.

Another object I saw of great interest to me was a Heathkit Lunchbox 6 meter radio. It really looked like an old fashioned lunch box complete with handle on the top. One of the dials on the front read: 50, 51, 52, 53 and 54. Obviously for all the frequencies that radio could receive. It even had an old metal microphone attached. Metal mikes, not something that is so easily seen today. Bulky, heavy, but very durable.

Lastly, on the steps next to the stage were some familiar looking radios that I remember using when I was into CB radios in the late 70's. There were two Cobra mobile CB's. Unfortunately, I don't remember the serial numbers, but one stood right out. It was a 40 channel mobile with all the bells and whistles including a switch for CB and PA. I remember one of my friends having that in his car hooked up to a PA speaker under his hood. Being mischievous teenagers, we would drive into "other" neighborhoods and shout things into the PA and then "burn rubber" trying to get away as fast as possible. Ahhh memories.

Needless to say, I will most likely be attending another Antique radio meet sometime in the future should an invitation come my way again. Perhaps it would be something you would like to attend only to see what objects from your past that would be showcased as an "antique".

I doubt anyone who knows us would categorize us as anything but technogeeks. We are constantly looking at the lastest technology (we are about to have an OFDM system running in GnuRadio for example) that could be of benefit to amateur radio in particular and communications in general. That said, though we both support this FCC decision, we are die hard CW users. Almost without exception, when we sit down in front of a radio in either of our homes, the first thing either of us touches is the paddle. I believe the FCC has done a thing they think will help save amateur radio. That they would attempt this is surprising since they could have just as easily made everyone do 20 wpm and killed the hobby for sure and then auctioned off the spectrum. I hope they are right and this succeeds. We must stop having our population grow one year older per year. This is a prescription for utter disaster. The other prescription for disaster is to sit on our backsides and fail to recruit new people, as many as we can that are under 30 years old, into our hobby. Software Radio, Cognitive Radio, and other high tech toys are good tools to use to recruit interesting your people. We have VHF UHF and Microwave equipment the likes of which many of us never dreamed would come to pass. USE THIS and other things as recruiting tools. It is up to each of us in the US to use this opportunity to do all we can do

for our hobby. If we do not begin to recruit new amateurs the inexorable march of demographics (our rising age) will end the amateur radio marketplace and then the hobby as sure as I am typing this note. May 2007 be a great year for Software Radio, VHF+, AMSAT, Packrats and amateur radio in general.

# FCC affirms big fine for marketing non-certified transceivers

The FCC has affirmed a \$14,000 fine it proposed in November in the case of a California radio amateur. The Commission alleges that Jason Kaltenbach, KE6CND, doing business as Metamerchant of Laguna Nigel, "willfully and repeatedly" violated FCC rules and the Communications Act of 1934 by marketing non-certified VHF and UHF transceivers on the eBay auction site. In a Forfeiture Order (NoF) released February 2, the FCC said Kaltenbach failed to respond to its November 9 Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture (NAL) <a href="http://">http://</a> hraunfoss.fcc.gov/edocs public/ attachmatch/DOC-268422A1.pdf>, so the Commis sion affirmed the fine based on the information it had. According to the NAL, an FCC agent found two models of KYD brand transceivers offered by Metamerchant, one capable of operating on 136 to 174 MHz at 3 W, the other capable of operating on 400 to 470 MHz at 4 W.

www.marylandfm.org West Friendship, MD Howard County Fair Grounds In January 2006, the FCC cited Kaltenbach, d/b/a Metamerchant, for violating §302(b) of the Communications Act and §2.803(a)(1) of its rules by marketing non-certified General Mobile Radio Service (GMRS) and Multi-Use Radio Service (MURS) transceivers. Kaltenbach told the Commission the gear had been listed accidentally and that he removed them from sale and corrected his auction listing. Nonetheless, the NAL recounted, an FCC agent was able to purchase a non-certified VHF transceiver via auction from Metamerchant last March. In July, the FCC's Seattle office received a complaint from someone who purchased a UHF transceiver from Metamerchant via eBay that was neither FCC-certified nor certifiable.


