

## WARC ALUMNI MEMBERSHIP

At the March 4, 1999 General Meeting, revisions to our club's constitution were approved that among other things, establishes a new Alumni membership category for former WARC members who are unable to attend meeting and Club activities on a regular basis due to health considerations or travel impediments. Dues for the Alumni membership were established at \$8.00 annually to cover the costs of printing and mailing our monthly FEEDBACK

## WARC Documents Revision Committee Has Finished its Work (or so it thinks)

The Warminster Amateur Radio Club's constitution requires a periodic analysis of the Club's organizing documents every three years to determine whether revisions should be proposed. Any member of the Club can propose changes to these documents at any time, but since most of us are human, it's unlikely that anyone would likely even look at the things. This requirement ensures that someone take a serious look at the documents every once in a while.

This time, our mission took an a slightly greater importance which started when I had out of curiosity asked some old-timers questions. I wanted to know if our club was a corporation, which is the equivalent of an artificial person under the law. I found out that we were incorporated on March 29, 1982, and also found the equivalent of a corporation's birth certificate called the "Articles of Incorporation". The corporation even has its own social security number issued by the Internal Revenue Service called an employer identification number. I was excited (I know, I get excited over strange things) about learning about something called a "501(c)(3) organization" which would allow our club to receive contributions from members including "junque" which would be tax deductible to the donors. It would provide an incentive for members, businesses and governmental bodies in our area to contribute funds, goods, and services to our organization.

Finally, in getting everything properly organized, we could suggest to these organizations in response to the question, "if we gave you what you're asking for from us, how could we turn down all the other worthy organizations who would ask us for the same thing?" the response, "ask them if they're a 501(c)(3) organization"! In other words, people will not only help us just because we're a worthy organization, but because it makes economic sense!

The IRS requires that for us to be a 501(c)(3) organization, we need to have certain provisions to make sure that we don't function as an improper tax shelter. We can't be a social organization, but must have a legitimate, charitable purpose. We easily meet this definition, but our organizing documents must spell this out, and include certain terminology to assure that no one can be making a profit from the club having this status. This is to preclude the possibility that someone would form such an organization, solicit tax-deductible contributions, wait until everyone has gone to sleep, and then quietly dissolve the organization, running off with the treasury without paying taxes on it. Vahan doesn't know how to do this, and neither do I, but I'm sure the IRS knows practically every way that has been done. Other provisions forbid such an organization from getting involved in political campaigns or lobbying for passage of legislation unless it is closely related to our primary mission of amateur radio, and even that should be only when absolutely necessary and secondary to our purpose in existing. This helps maintain the independence of the club from partisan politics which can help us avoid many emotionally charged situations at the local level.

Our documents must first be what I will call "501(c)(3) compliant". This means that they adhere to suggested wording by the IRS which provides these protections to the

public and our membership. Although this in itself would allow the club to function as a 501(c)(3) organization legally, it's better to then submit these revised documents to the IRS, pay them a \$100 user fee, and have them provide a more or less binding opinion that we're legit, and that any contributions to the Club such as for our annual auction will be tax deductible. I worked up these revisions in conjunction with cochair Mike Patton, WA3MJP who among his other amazing talents possesses a law degree. I submitted a copy of our work to former club member Steve White, who specializes in this type of law in his legal practice in Tampa, Florida. Steve made several suggestions which his experience showed could forestall possible objections with the IRS if we decide to go ahead with the 501(c)(3) application. In any case, I have his legal opinion that the proposed documents are compliant, which certainly is the first step. Getting the IRS to provide its blessing is a long-term project which can take several years, but I feel confident that the 501(c)(3) compliant status will serve the club for some of our purposes for the time being, maybe even getting savings on our liability insurance premiums (The Federal Volunteer Protection Act protects us from personal liability claims while doing charitable work - the Federal 501 (c)(3) designation would strengthen our claim that we're doing charitable work, and since we're protected as individuals. there's less chance that our club would be liable on behalf of its members - at least that's the argument I'd make to our insurance company)

The IRS requires that its major requirements be stated in the Articles of Incorporation, and that this document take precedence over any other documents. The reason for this is that the Articles of Incorporation are publicly recorded in the records of a PA state agency, and I presume that if they were ever changed, the IRS would have some way of knowing it, and have the chance to revoke the 501(c)(3) status if

appropriate. So, I amended the Articles of Incorporation to include all the stuff to make them 501(c)(3)compliant, and figure that after approval, they will again sink back into the state of oblivion and presumed bliss that they experienced before my dis covery of their existence this year. Now, there are things that were copied from our constitution to the Articles which I kept in the constitution as well, which will be more accessible and easier to change than the Articles. These are the items which are essential to maintaining 501(c)(3) organization status. If any changes were made in the future to the constitution which contradict the Articles, the Articles would take precedence, which would keep our status with the IRS from being jeopardized. The by - laws are even easier to change than our constitution - the latter requires at least two general meetings to change, while the by - laws can be changed at any meeting.

We've also cleaned up some vague provisions, as well as ones which have no meaning anymore. Certain provisions such as quorums have been consolidated into one place for ease in reference. One thing we've added is a broad ban against unlawful discrimination against people for membership, which I feel is necessary as we make extensive use of public facilities. A more controversial provision requires that officers be members for at least six months before being nominated - in a lean year, we may have trouble finding people with experience, but on the other hand, this provision makes more difficult a takeover attempt by another club whose members might join en masse right before an election. Election procedures have been standardized - elections are now going to be generally in May -January elections will be only to fill vacancies which had previously been filled by the Board. Mark Kempisty will be president for life; otherwise the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and two elected directors will be elected in May for

terms beginning July 1. Two additional directors will be appointed by the Board in January for 1 year terms which will assure that following the bloodbath that will occur next July that there will be carryover board members with experience to help the new board members and officers. The previous president will also be a member of the Board for similar reasons. If we lose our president for any reason, the vice president fills the un-expired term - there's no interim appointment or election for that position.

Finally, there are provisions allowing for electronic distribution of legal notifications and even electronic balloting. Even state and Federal law now permit legal transactions to be conducted electronically but our current documents do not. Ipso exacto fundamento - these Latin words have been added to make the free legal service being furnished to the club to appear to be of a higher level than they actually are as I am not a lawyer. Your Board has held two special meetings to debate, discuss, and suggest changes to the new documents, and has voted to recommend to the membership that we approve these documents as revised. Until serving on this committee, I never realized how much time and dedication our Board members put into the administration and planning of your club. To me, things always seemed to go so smoothly that I never realized how great our Board members really are! I

could never even begin to invest the time and energy they put into our organization! There is a lot more that could have been done with our documents, but our Board has apparently come to a consensus that the proposed document has gone far enough for the time being. While the Board's approval is not legally binding to the membership, I feel that we ignore its collective wisdom, experience, and sense of what the membership wants at our own peril! If you don't like something, you can start your own committee and propose your own amendments (permitted by the documents). Also, every possible typographical error has already been dis covered, and there are absolutely no more typos left to be found! If anyone finds any more or argues with me about this, I am going to cry.

At our October meeting, the membership had voted to consider the revised documents - the purpose of this was to keep from wasting club time with frivolous amendments made by crackpots. I was very much emotionally moved by the club's vote of confidence in me in light of this! At our November meeting, we can vote on the proposed documents if the membership feels it is ready to do so. Otherwise, we will need to wait until our January meeting for the next opportunity. If the club would like to spend some time in open discussion of the documents on top of what the Board has already done, that is its

prerogative, and I of course will be glad to attempt to answer any questions or make minor changes in wording if called upon. It is up to you to determine the course of action.

### **K3DN Grange Fair Special Event Station**

The Warminster Amateur Radio Club, K3DN operated a special event station during the Grange Fair, August 13-17, 2003. The special event commemorated the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Battle of Crooked Billet. The Revolutionary War battle was fought in the Hatboro area.

We operated in our usual position in the back corner of the last tent. It was good to be back at the Grange after we had decided not to attend last year. The weather cooperated for the most part although it was quite hot. Two big box fans helped out in that department. Setup went well except we found out that a section of the club vertical was missing. I made a quick trip home to get my emergency 80-40-20 meter tapped dipole. We set it up in an inverted-V arrangement hung from the club's telescopic mast. Bill, K3ZMA; Russ, KB3FNY;

Randy, N3LJE and Doug, WA3DSP accomplished the setup. Operation started on Wednesday the 13th at about 2 PM. The station worked well. We used the club TS-440. Band switching was dependent on conditions and the time of day. It took about 2 minutes and required lowering the center of the dipole, which was on a pulley, and setting the jumpers. By Sunday the 17<sup>th</sup> we had worked over 200 stations and lots of DX. DX included Israel, Germany, UK and many others. As of press time we have sent out about 48 certificates confirming contacts. 
