

A Tech on Ten

Hey Gang!

10 Meters is an important band to all of us; especially Technicians! We only get to use the chunk of frequencies between 28.000Mhz and 28.500Mhz. The modes we can use there breakdown as follows:

28.000Mhz -28.300Mhz CW, RTTY and other Data Modes

28.300Mhz -28.500Mhz CW and Single Side Band Phone

I'm still new at this, and no, I wasn't a Boy Scout so I don't know CW, Just got a brief introduction to Digital modes, and RTTY is not part of my arsenal, so, that leaves me with Single Side Band Phone operation (for the time being!). Many of us Techs are still in the same boat and would jump at the opportunity to operate in HF. But, "200MHz Worth?!" I can hear you grumbling sarcastically. "That's not even worth investing in a radio for." Ah, but it really is unless you are content with your 2 Meter/ 440Mhz radio and don't want to reach higher and Go for the Gusto. Nothing wrong with sticking to those frequencies, enjoy them! However, Your General License is right around the corner and you can bet on getting it, so why not learn how to operate on 10M HF now even on Phone!

I discussed the bands briefly with one of the Extras at a recent meeting night. I was doing my usual complaining about the lack of opening on 10 Meters and his comment was something like 10 is just dead...but then all of the sudden in mid September, that dead 10 Meters surprised us all! In the evening I began to hear Beacons. And some signs of life, distant QSOs too weak to make out, some calls on the calling Frequency 28.400Mhz and just generally more activity. Then it happened to me. In the evening of Sept. 20th, I made it 1650 miles away on 28.390Mhz into S.Texas near Mexico. And again on the evening of Sept. 21st my furthest contact yet, Rio de Janero, nearly 5000 miles away on 28.460Mhz. We as Technicians actually have the world at our fingertips just like the big boys!

10 Meters will come and go (as all of the bands do from time to time) after we get more and more sun spot activity during the current solar cycle that peaks in 2014 I believe. Although we as Techs can't (well, we can if a General or an Extra supervise us as the Control Operator) generally transmit on bands like 15,20,40, and 75 Meters, we can however Listen and Learn Good operating technique...being courteous, what info. to have ready to exchange in a contest or even in Dxing as the sought after station only has time to give you a signal report, a call sign, name, location say 73 and move on. This ain't no rag chew! Listen and Learn I repeat! And then, bring it back to 10M and practice if you get the chance. Its Fun! Of course theres actually plenty of rag chewing opportunity now too as the band "opens". All I'm saying is don't write off 10 just yet. Take advantage of it. There are plenty of Generals and Extras that enjoy it, but its our only HF to practice on. Go for it! You can bet I am! Oh, and chase that General or Extra License!

Membership Corner October 2011

Current membership is about 109 members as I write this on October first, while there are 126 members who are current or no more than 3 months behind in dues payment and 148 members on our rolls which go back to 1 year overdue. I explained last month why the different numbers.

The bigger problem is notifying members when their dues are due and email doesn't seem to do too well in that regard. The membership is spread over all 12 months and a period of 3 years and if you think that is easy to keep track of, I have a part-time job for you!

For these reasons we've been talking about switching to one uniform membership date for the whole club. At the moment Al, WI3Z, our valiant webmaster of k3dn.org is in the process of adding another button for monthly increments on the PayPal dues spot so you can easily pay the correct amount in \$1.65 increments to get you on a January to January schedule. SOLAR UPDATE

Tad "The Sun shines forever http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7w0MWv4rfH0" Cook, K7RA, reports: Our Sun has been very active this past week, with the average solar flux rising nearly 12 points to 155.5, while the average daily sunspot numbers dropped nearly 41 points to 96.1. This implies fewer, but more intense, sunspots. A huge sunspot group numbered 1302 emerged on September 22. This was the source of a coronal mass ejection that triggered an immense geomagnetic storm. The planetary A index peaked at 67 on September 26, followed by 30 the next day and 24 on September 28. The planetary K index reached 8 for two of the threehour reporting periods on September 26, indicating an intense geomagnetic storm. The resulting aurora was observed in many places, including Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, North Dakota and South Dakota. On September 22, there was a major X1.4 class solar flare at 1100 UTC, with a large CME, but this was when sunspot 1302 was just coming over the horizon, so it wasn't Earth-directed. On September 24, sunspot group 1302 produced a larger X1.9 flare. Currently, the latest forecast from NOAA/ USAF has solar flux for September 29-October 7 at 130, 130, 125, 120, 120, 115, 110, 110 and 140, and then 145 on October 8-10 and 140 on October 11-17. The predicted planetary A index is 12, 5 and 8 on September 29 through October 1, then 5 on October 2-7, then 8, 15, 12 and 8 on October 8-11 and 5 on October 12-21. ARRL BRIEFS WHITE HOUSE STAFF ON AMATEUR RADIO'S CAPABILITIES DURING EMERGENCIES

On September 12, at the invitation of White House Cybersecurity Coordinator Howard A. Schmidt, W7HAS http://www.arrl.org/news/white-house-names-ham-as-new-cybersecurity-coordinator, the ARRL briefed several members of the National Security Staff on the capabilities of the Amateur Radio Service to communicate in emergencies. "The White House is looking for ways that the great work of Amateur Radio operators can continue to support emergencies in the future with particular attention to increased use and dependency on Internet-based technologies," Schmidt said. The ARRL presentation, conducted by Emergency Preparedness Manager Mike Corey, W5MPC -- along with President Kay Craigie, N3KN, and Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ --focused on Amateur Radio's current and evolving capabilities to provide Internet messaging connectivity.

HB9DRV Sells Rights to Ham Radio Deluxe

Simon Brown, HB9DRV, has sold the rights to his popular *Ham Radio Deluxe* software package to a group consisting of Mike Carper, WA9PIE, Randy Gawtry, K0CBH and Rick Ruhl, W4PC. All three principals have more than 25 years of experience with radio data communications. Rick Ruhl is the president of **W4PC Software, Inc** whose products include the *PakRatt*, *PKTerm* and *Radio Operations Center* software suites. Randy Gawtry is the president of **Timewave Technology Inc** whose products include the PK and DSP families of data controllers and other commercial data products. Mike Carper is an experienced Fortune 500 technology executive, educator and featured speaker in the areas of wireless technologies and IT Service Management.

"Simon has done a fantastic job with this software," Carper said. "His vision for integrating rig control, rotor control, logging, digital modes, and satellite operations into a single integrated feature-rich software suite has captivated the ham radio community. We'd like to see this product continue in a way that respects the hard work put into this package by Simon and others, maintaining that vision, while delivering timely fixes and feature enhancements in the future, will be the number one priority."

"After many years writing the *Ham Radio Deluxe* software it's necessary to take a break and hand the whole project over to another team," said Simon Brown, HB9DRV. "The support effort required has become more than I can realistically manage, with many thousands of users, new radios and other hardware appearing all the time and unexpected changes to the infrastructure used by *Ham Radio Deluxe* such as QRZ.com, I no longer have any time at all for other projects. As some of you will know, I have formed a company called **SDR-RADIO.com GmbH** and I am now working in the Software Defined Radio arena with RFspace. This is the technology of the future; a future I want a part of. In 2012 I plan to return to England and get back on the air, something I haven't done much during the last 25 years."

The new owners are in the process of building a development environment for *Ham Radio Deluxe* and they plan to begin by addressing some of the bugs in the existing "To Do List" for an upcoming version 5.1 release. The 5.1 release will be made available at no charge to registered users when completed.

HEATHKIT'S AMATEUR RADIO PLANS TAKING SHAPE

Heathkit Educational Systems hopes to reenter the Amateur Radio market by the end of 2011. Back in August, Heathkit announced http://www.arrl.org/news/heathkit-returns-to-the-kit-business its return to the kit business and actively solicited suggestions. The response from Amateur Radio operators convinced Heathkit to develop several Amateur Radio products.

"When we made the announcement on our web page about a month ago, we had no intention of entering the Amateur Radio kit market," Ernie Wake, Heathkit's Director of Sales and Marketing, told the ARRL. "The response was really overwhelming, exciting and scary. The scary part is that the brand name has so much loyalty that we don't want to disappoint the people who have such fond memories."

Wake said that Heathkit is presently working on developing a few Amateur Radio kits. "Initially, the kit line will include a few 'accessories,' like kits for a Dual Watt Meter, Antenna Tuners and the Cantenna," he explained. "Once we are a little more 'settled,' I think we will develop a QRP receiver. We won't rush to market just to get there. We want to develop a line of kits in the tradition of Heathkit. I'm hoping to have one or two kits by the end-of-the-year."

Missouri Hams Help Out When 911 Service Goes Down

It doesn't take a major disaster for Amateur Radio to step in and save the day. Around 9 PM on September 5, a cable cut completely isolated the Johnson County 911 Center in Warrensburg, Missouri, impacting landline, Internet and cellular service. Johnson County -- home to Whiteman Air Force Base -- is located just east of the Kansas City metro area.


Johnson County's emergency plan called for the telephone company to transfer all 911 calls to the Henry County 911 facility in Clinton, Missouri; Henry County is the next county south of Johnson County. But an equipment problem at Henry County's center prevented the transfer from completing successfully. Calls were then routed to the Benton County 911 Center in Warsaw, Missouri; Benton County is the next county west of Henry County. This transfer was successful and calls started coming in to Warsaw. Unfortunately, Warsaw is more than 40 miles from Warrensburg, and the two centers were unable to establish communication using the county VHF radio facilities.

It was then that radio amateurs were brought in to provide communications support. Johnson County Emergency Management Director Gloria Michalski, KC0TPB, activated the Johnson County ARES® group, while Benton County Emergency Management Director Gary England, KC0ZYL, activated the Benton County ARES® group. Amateur Radio operators from both groups reported to their respective Emergency Operations Centers, and using the VHF repeater facility operated by the Warrensburg Area Amateur Radio Club, quickly established reliable communications. Hams relayed the 911 calls between the two centers, with the hams in Benton County handing the calls off to Warrensburg officials for dispatch.

The Club Station - K3DN - is located at the Benjamin Wilson Senior Center, Delmont Avenue, Warminster, PA. The station is open for club members and the interested general public on non-holiday Tuesday evenings from 7 to 9 pm . The station is fully operational on HF (80 meters through 10 meters) both phone and CW. There is an assortment of amateur radio shareware which may be copied under the shareware licensing agreement.

"Many people think a major disaster is the only time ARES® members may be called into action," said ARRL Missouri Section Emergency Coordinator Kenneth Baremore, W0KRB. "This type of real-life example helps to point out why we need to have good relationships with our served agencies, as well as being prepared to respond at a moment's notice. We know about severe storms as they come into the area, be it tornadoes or ice storms. But we can't be aware of when a backhoe is going astray."

According to Michalski, radio amateurs remained at both sites until the local telephone company fixed the problem at 9:30 AM the next day. While only about 15 calls were transferred, she said that amateurs handled at least one life-critical call.

Calling Amateur Radio operators "awesome!" she said that the service that both ARES® groups provided during the 911 outage was "invaluable. I assure you that this office has a healthy working relationship with our ARES® group. They are always there for us and the community. I use every opportunity to promote the group publicly and support their Amateur Radio classes." -- Thanks to Rick Harkins,


